Stoke Climsland Parish Hall

Following the successful launch of our 'Friends of Stoke Climsland Parish Hall' event back in February, we welcomed the opportunity to share further details and update the wider community at our 'drop-in' event at the start of April. At the earlier event we outlined a phased approach to the renovations in line with potential funding streams. The initial aim was to be ready to start on the renewal of the hall roof within the existing planning permission deadline of autumn 2023,

The Parish Hall CIO trustees, although few in number (any interest in joining as a trustee would be most welcome), were pleased and encouraged by the positive response from those who called in throughout the session. There is a general acceptance that the process of bidding for capital funds in a very competitive world is quite literally a 'lottery'. But with the support through the Prince's Foundation of fully contracted and professional fundraisers, we are well placed to gain funding over the coming months. Watch this space!

Thanks are due to the Duchy of Cornwall who continue as our landlord to offer guidance through the process of the transfer of lease/ownership to the Parish Hall CIO, as well as in the approach to the overall project refurbishment.

Finally, we are pleased to report the formation of a 'Friends of the Parish Hall' sub-committee who are putting together a full programme of fundraising events for the next 12 months. These will encourage community engagement and help cover ongoing hall running costs as well as the purchase of additional equipment and furnishing required after Phases 1 and 2 of the build. More details will be given in next month's Old School News.

Down on 'The Mark the Farm Historically the mon

'The Merry Month of May'

Historically the month of May to most farmers has meant one thing - Single Farm Payment Day! The deadline day of 15th May has been embedded in every farmer's mind and

calendar right across Europe from the Shetland Islands to Sicily (no doubt the Mafia completed their forms on time). However, and despite the UK leaving the European Union several years ago, DEFRA/RPA (Rural Payments Agency) still insist that we complete an entry of every crop and stock across our farmland holdings down to the last single metre (0.0001ha). Digital satellite mapping, or 'spy in the sky', will identify any deviation or error due to a slip of the pen or finger on the PC.

Now, somewhat surprisingly, halfway through the 'transition' toward zero payment by 2027, we are informed by the RPA that this will be the final year we need to input such detailed data. From next year, 2024, our farmed land will be 'delinked' from the remaining pittance of support payment. Hurrah, you may hear the cry! But nothing so simple from the civil servants and paymasters in Nobel House. DEFRA will need a new National Land Use Database. Early indications suggest the need to remap



and then categorise every field according to its cropping or stocking potential. A mammoth task despite having already remapped the entire country twice in the past 30 years. Funnily enough, landscapes and field boundaries, especially in the traditional and protected areas of the Southwest, do not change in size or location. So, little there to worry about one would presume.

But it is some recent and currently ongoing events that are causing the greatest level of anxiety and concern. Local to the Westcountry a major legal battle is unfolding in the far reaches of West Cornwall: a long established and respected protected SSSI (Site of Special Scientific Interest), the West Penwith Moors (St Ives to St Just) is to be extended to take in control eighty-five farms and their surrounds by Natural England. Although much of the designated land is of marginal moorland, it is the adjoining pastureland, mostly in private ownership, that currently supports both dairy and beef units that will have compulsory restriction under the proposed regulations. Further battles of land use rage closer. On Dartmoor, the National Park Authority is in conflict with both Duchy of Cornwall tenants and other private estates over the right to 'wild camp' now returning to the courts. All against a backdrop of intense lobbying from some environmental groups to pressurise Natural England to destock 90-100% of sheep from winter grazing across the commons.

With the wider call for a 'rewilding programme', along with renewed political pressure to revisit the 'right to roam' policy, we have an interesting combination. We, as farmers and a rural population, do indeed live in interesting times. The 15th May deadline will be a thing of the past but heed the 'mayday' call from us all 'Down on the Farm'



EAST CORNWALL MINING HISTORY ASSOCIATION


Last month we enjoyed a talk by Jeff Harrison of Cornwall Resources Ltd who are exploring for renewed mineral extraction at Kelly Bray and surrounding area. We learned that modern investigation naturally goes to places where copper, tin, etc have been found in the past, but that they are now able to look for deposits at far greater depths and seek a wider range of minerals. Although lithium is present in quantity at Holmbush/Redmoor, richer deposits have been found further west in Cornwall, and so tungsten, tin and copper are most likely to be extracted locally. Modern mining methods have ensured that local people were hardly aware of the investigative drilling, thanks to walls of straw bales, and actual mining will be similarly restrained. A design for the mine is being prepared for planning, but most of the work will be so far underground that there will be comparatively little to see at the surface. Jeff and others at CRL are happy to answer questions at any time on 01579 533 825 or at their offices in Beeching Park, and a brief overview can be



found on their website at https://www.cornwallresources.com There was inevitably a lot of local interest. We were grateful to Jeff for his second visit to us, and glad to have a packed room at The Old School.

CARBON ZERO HOMES PROJECT

As part of our commitment to achieve Carbon Net Zero in the Parish by 2030, The Parish Council is pleased to announce that the Carbon Zero Homes project has received £54,648.51 from the UK Government through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund." to set up and run a whole house retrofit advice service for the parish. The aim of this service is to help residents reduce their energy

demand by insulating their homes. This will include providing advice on sources of funding where appropriate and access to qualified professionals to undertake the work.

In Stoke Climsland only about 20% of houses are on mains gas. The rest are using LPG or Fuel Oil for their heating and cooking needs. Furthermore, the housing stock is quite old and about 80% of housing in the parish has an EPC rating of D or less. The desired EPC rating is C or above.



As many of you will know it will not be possible to replace oil boilers with new after 2025 and with mains gas its 2035. Therefore, the deadlines for replacing fossil fuels with renewable energy are fast approaching.

Before solar and renewable heating can be considered; home insulation must be addressed. This is known as fabric first. Renewable energy systems work at lower temperatures than fossil fuel systems. For them to be effective it is

essential that the home is fully insulated (floors, walls, windows, and roof). It is also important that any damp is dealt with. Damp homes require 40% more energy to heat. Adequate Ventilation is also important. These measures will help reduce energy costs.

The Parish Council will employ a Community Energy Advisor to set up and run the service and we are currently recruiting for that position. If you are interested, please contact the Parish Clerk.

This project is [funded/part-funded] by the UK Government through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund. Cornwall Council has been chosen by Government as a Lead Authority for the fund and is responsible for monitoring the progress of projects funded through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund in Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly.



OPINION PIECE: **SELLING THE ENVIRONMENT SHORT?**

The current public discussion of environmental damage is largely framed around three distinct arguments. We can call them fear, sentiment and technology. The fear argument says that we must do something about pollution, plastics, and fossil fuels since we are doomed if we do not. The sentimental argument says how terrible it is that the beautiful and amazing natural world is being degraded. The technological argument says that, if we only invest enough money and effort, we can develop technologies that will get us out of our current bother.

It may be that climate change denial has been replaced by a sense that, as individuals, we can do very little to impact on the problem and that, unless governments agree on strategies to deal with it, we should resign ourselves to learning to live with environmental degradation for a very long time. The signs are not good: successive international conferences take inadequate forward steps and national governments are generally incapable of thinking beyond the short term. Fundamentally, most of us do not have a clear perception of the extent to which we can safely exploit the environment. Whilst fear, sentiment and technological hope may all have access to some truth, none of them offers a sufficient, moral, agreed, and sustainable long-term basis for maintaining environmental health and equilibrium.

There can be little doubt that we have the intellectual and physical power to achieve that equilibrium. But we lack a collective understanding of our position within the environment and our obligations to it and to the people for whom environmental degradation is far more serious than it is for us. After all, it is the developed world (of which we're a part) that has caused our present problems but the developing world that is suffering their greatest effects.

So, we have some questions to answer. Is any country or individual morally entitled to unlimited exploitation of environmental resources? When governments talk about growing their countries' economies, should that be an overriding goal or should it be subject to limits imposed by environmental considerations? Should we subjugate national interests to international needs? Should you or I vote for a government that places economic growth above all other considerations? Should all levelling be levelling up? And on the technological front, are we deluded when we believe

that electric cars, nuclear power and carbon capture will get us out of the mess?

The recognition of human rights has been a major development of the last 100 years. We also recognise the existence of animal rights as an acceptable concept. Does the environment have 'rights'? In other words, are there activities that are so profoundly damaging that they are unacceptable? And who decides? Can we rely on national governments to arbitrate or does this require a level of internationalism that we've never yet achieved?

Perhaps we are not mature enough as a species to defer to the needs of others and to the need for environmental health. Perhaps the learning curve is much, much steeper than we thought.

Your Parish Council have once again worked with the various groups within the parish and provided the finance to make this weekend of celebration possible.


They have purchased the medallions to be given to each primary age child and hired the marquee and equipment to be used.

STOKE CLIMSLAND WI

In April, our speaker was Anna from The Westcountry Rivers Trust, which is based in the village. She gave us a brief outline of the work they do in Cornwall, Devon and in parts of Dorset and Somerset to preserve, protect, develop, and improve the region's watercourses.

We were particularly interested to learn more about the 'Westcountry Citizen Science Investigations Project'. This scheme aims to educate and engage people with the water environment. By becoming a volunteer 'Citizen Scientist' you can make a valuable contribution to help restore and protect the region's freshwater environments. The data that are collected by the Citizen Scientists can be used to target and identify degrading water bodies, pollution can be spotted and reported promptly. Citizen Scientists gather data from their chosen river location each month using a Water Quality Kit. This tests for clarity, temperature, phosphates, and dissolved solids and then the results are uploaded. Collecting regular water quality samples not only produces good data but helps the Citizen Scientists to get to know their river through observations. We were very interested to hear more about this Project and several of our members were interested in becoming involved. BACH AT THE OLD SCHOOL

The Old School Classical Club has a long and prestigious record of attracting good musicians to perform evening concerts to sell-out audiences who also enjoy an interval dinner prepared and served in a warm and friendly atmosphere. It is something that The Old School did very well until rising costs and Covid brought the programme to a halt 3 or 4 years ago.

So, a Saturday morning concert early in March was something of a departure. We were recommended as a venue for a piano recital by celebrated musician Libby Burgess who is currently touring every county where, at each concert, she plays some of Bach's Preludes and Fugues, of which there are 48. The whole project is in support of charities which provide support to musicians (particularly younger ones) and is a long-term commitment involving a lot of travel to and fro across the country.

We were not at all sure that we'd get an audience, but we were packed. There was no interval dinner but there were cakes and teas and coffees. And Libby's performance wowed our audience. Then, having covered all necessary expenses, ticket receipts and donations made it possible to forward a substantial amount to Libby's Project fund.

"The next morning's venue, for the next ten preludes and fugues, was a converted school, in the picturesque village of Stoke Climsland - a decent drive away across Bodmin Moor. The team organising had been to wonderful lengths, putting on a magnificent spread of cakes, the tables beautifully decorated with daffodils. The piano had been generously provided by Clive Pinkham - who claimed that he hadn't yet finished making it!! - but it was a lovely instrument nonetheless, mellow, and sweet. This may have been a small venue, but it was packed, with a really welcoming atmosphere. The Old School seems to be a really wonderful (and well-used) resource in the village: activities there range from book clubs to osteopathy to IT clinics to dance - and of course, live music. It was great to hear that their in-house concert series, the Classical Club, is getting going again after the inevitable hiatus of the last


The first cut of grass has happened, and the smell of cut grass was a welcome return.

The Crown

I discovered today that the Netflix series The Crown, a programme about the British Royal family, is quite popular in France, who'd have thought it? I am writing the week after President Macron advised King Charles III not to visit due to demonstrations and protests by people about a number of things, including the rise in pension age and that the President is behaving like a king! A royal visit could be seen as further provocation. Well, I'm presuming those rioting aren't the same people as those who are fans of The Crown!

France, over many years in the 18th & early 19th Century had a number of revolutions, three in fact and the country was quite unstable, febrile and not a safe place for royalty and aristocracy. With such feelings within the French cultural DNA, one can understand the caution of the President.

If you've watched Poldark, or read the books, you'll have picked up the fear of a constant threat of France invading and even without this, the felt danger of republicanism being seeded by France. Yet, we didn't have a revolution similar to the French ones. The historian Herbert Butterfield has put this down to the effects of the Methodist movement. Methodism started out as a movement doit gagner within the Church of England through the preaching of Revd John Wesley (1703-1791); who formed new converts to Christ into small groups where their faith was accountable and where they were encouraged to become better 'holy' people. Right at the heart of what Methodist's believe, is that Christ can change our lives for the better. This then changed society. My own history tutor Professor Diarmaid MacCulloch in his book and TV series A History of Christianity

estimates that by the death of John Wesley in 1791 50% of the people in England were Methodist. So, one can see how revolution may have been avoided, yet in the early days because 'the Methodies' were meeting in small groups outside of the normal parish structures, they were accused of just the opposite.

So, back to the Crown, our nation is looking forward to the Coronation of King Charles III. Here in Stoke Climsland we have a deep affection for our monarch, who as the Duke of Cornwall has shown stewardship to his estate. Many of our farmers are tenants and so with this background he will understand the challenges of farming. So, many of us will watch the Coronation of our monarch on Saturday May 6th and may I encourage us to say a prayer for him and our Royal family.

CHURCH MATTERS - BETWEEN TIMES

By the time you read this, Easter will have come and gone. You will be in between times. During the seven-week interval between Easter and Pentecost, the first followers of Jesus had been told to wait until the Spirit comes. They were witnesses to an incredible event: the resurrection of a man who was clearly, a few days before, dead (the Romans ensured this was the case). It blew their minds and completely transformed them from being a scattered, fearful, and despondent group into courageous and joy filled people who turned the world upside down. But first, they needed something or someone to help them. Jesus, now risen from the dead, appeared to his followers on one occasion, while he was eating with them, and said:

"Do not leave Jerusalem, but wait for the gift my Father promised, which you have heard me speak about. For John baptized with water, but in a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit." (Acts 1: 4 - 5)

The Holy Spirit is often called the 'Counsellor' or the 'Advocate' who was poured out at the first Pentecost after Jesus' death and would continue to be poured out until Jesus comes again. This marks the birth of the Church, who live between the times; sometimes referred to as the last days. The Spirit is spoken of in this striking liquid form partly because of the link with baptism and because, when outpoured upon a person, they have an overwhelming experience of being filled, cleansed, healed, uplifted, reborn, even that they are drenched with the Spirit.

Jesus talks about the Spirit as the one who gives life, insight, who sustains them in suffering or opposition and who gives them the words to say. The word used for 'Spirit' is 'Pneuma' for the Spirit is the Christian's very breath, giving them spiritual life. The Spirit is like the wind that blows that cannot be seen but is powerful enough to move huge ships across the sea. The presence of the Spirit convicts us of the things which are wrong, and cause hurt and opens our eyes to the things of God. The Spirit never forces a way into our lives but descends as gentle

It is not surprising that Jesus tells them not to start off building his kingdom until the Spirit comes. Having an Advocate like this is essential. The work Jesus gives his followers to do would be impossible without the Spirit's power (the original word for power = dunamis: from which we get the word dynamite). We talk about spirituality and that we are spiritual beings and we all truly are. The Holy Spirit is described as a person, a 'he' in English translations. Yet the 'Spirit' is not described in masculine or feminine gender forms in the original languages (Spirit is neuter in Greek,

female in Hebrew and Masculine in Aramaic!). Yet the Spirit is not an 'it' or a force but a real person! Let's be sure of one thing, grammatical gender is not the same as personal gender. In a way, this defies traditional logic and tells us something about the divine nature of the Spirit as person transcending gender.

During these in between times, we too need the Holy Spirit as much as the first disciples. The very account of the Acts of the Apostles is probably best described as the Acts of the Holy Spirit working in and through ordinary flawed people. Are you in between times, waiting for the next stage of your life to begin? Maybe ask God, who is not far from each of us, to pour out the Holy Spirit upon us so we are immersed in love, power and know the presence of Jesus is always with us? It requires an act of faith just as if you want to catch the wind, you need to put up a sail.



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
