### PARISH HALL NEWS

The parish hall trustees continue to evaluate sources of funding. We have quite a hill to climb to deliver the approved plans (planning permission expires Oct 2023) the original costs were estimated at £850k, but prices have gone up and these costs are being recalculated.



# To date we have around £105 available from grants and cash. We have submitted applications to the Trusthouse Foundation (£10k) and to the National Heritage Lottery Fund (£80k). We are now drafting an application to the Good Growth fund. We will also be approaching a number of people whom we feel can help us to broaden or endorse our funding applications.

A number of you have been interviewed to gain an initial view on our approach to fundraising. It is important that we are creative in finding ways to fund and deliver in order to meet the community expectations developed from those workshops and consultations. Your help is essential if we are to make this work. Think about ways to raise monies, free services , donations of materials, labour, or organised fundraising events. As the saying goes 'failure is not an option' the other is 'all options are on the table'. The choice is in our hands.

### Happy Retirement

On 25 November, Stoke Climsland School said a fond farewell to both Angie Beer and Marion Kinsman after many a year in their roles running the school's kitchen.

It all began in September 1989 for Angie, when she started her career as school cook at The Old School. Numbers were slightly less then - a lot lower than the average 130 meals she now cooks each day! In 1990, Angie remembers winning the Kraft Foodservice Award for doubling the daily school dinner numbers.

Another accolade in 2001 was the Heartbeat Award from the Chartered Institute of Environmental Health. Stoke was the first school in Cornwall to win this award which encourages catering establishments to offer healthier options on their menus.

Another proud moment was to be voted one of Britain's top three dinner ladies in 2005. When toy company, Sylvanian Families launched its Search for a School Star contest to celebrate the arrival of a new character, Dorothy the Dinner Lady, 5 year old Jasmine wrote about Angie and drew a picture of her. Angie was declared one of two runners up winning a trophy and certificate with the school receiving £200 worth of toys and a prize for Jasmine!

Marion joined Angie in June 1996, when the new school was built, to help serve the dinners. At first, as the kitchen in the school wasn't fully operational, Angie cooked the meals in Callington Primary School which were then transported, via taxi, to the new school to be served by both.

As well as cooking, Angie was actively involved with the school netball team, helping them win lots of tournaments and cup competition matches. Each year Marion and Angie were always in charge of the winning ribbon as the pupils sprinted towards the finishing line on sports day. Another important job they were both tasked with was to judge the annual decorated Easter egg competition!

It's always so nice to hear that when the year 6 pupils are getting ready to leave Stoke to embark on their new secondary school life, one of the things the children say they are going to miss the most is Angie's school dinners - especially the roast dinners

every Tuesday!

Angie and Marion were a wonderful team, always reliable and they'll be greatly missed. On behalf of all the pupils, friends and colleagues, past and present, have a very happy and healthy retirement.



### CALLINGTON SINGERS IN STOKE CLIMSLAND CHURCH

The Callington Singers are looking forward to a special concert on the 10th December at 4:30pm in Stoke Climsland Church. The choir will be singing excerpts from the Messiah by G.F. Handel and a selection of traditional and ancient Christmas Carols. The choir are pleased to be joined by professional soprano soloist Samantha Rowe. #### Wildlife at St Sampson's Church, South Hill

We have renamed the church tower as a bug hotel and think it must be one of the biggest bug hotels around. A lovely nest of ladybirds (possibly Harlequin ladybirds, see note below) was found just inside one of the louvre windows halfway up the tower, and butterflies found in the nooks and crannies. I can only imagine how many spiders there must be, but didn't look too hard! It would be interesting to know how many bug species we are home to. There was also much evidence of Jackdaws having nested earlier in the year, with their messy stick nest behind the highest grille in the bell chamber. They could also be heard in the porch last spring, surprising the visitors. The amount of sticks on the floor made me wonder if they were chucking them at passers by! The bats have been around as normal this year and now are finding themselves places for the winter. Our churchyard, like many churchyards, are great undisturbed places for much wildlife and we

are very happy to share with them. We are always looking at how we can be a better eco church.

Soil carbon sampling - There were more churches that wanted to be part of this citizen science project than places available and sadly we weren't chosen. However we hope to do a species audit later in the year and the more people to help the better.

Carols by Candlelight - Tuesday 13th December 7pm

Nine lessons and carols, St Sampson's style. This is always a wonderful evening, hear the story of Christmas, sing traditional carols, all lit by candlelight and ending with mulled wine and mince pies.

Café Tingle - Sunday 18th December 10am

If you've never made a Christingle, or don't know what it's about, come along and find out. A relaxed service for adults and children, plenty of coffee and festive treats.

As per the advice - https://www.rhs.org.uk/biodiversity/harlequin-ladybird - there are no means of controlling harlequin ladybirds, since any actions taken against them would also be harmful to native ladybirds, other aphid predators and other insects. In addition, they are now so well established and abundant that destroying a few in one area will not make any difference to their overall numbers.

When found in buildings the ladybirds can be tolerated or captured and released out of doors.

In a trouble free world we could be 'sure as eggs are eggs' that turkeys would not vote for Christmas or chickens would wish to be 'cooped up for winter'! But 'feathers have been ruffled' due to the migratory birds 'flying their nest' then spreading a deadly disease and now the 'chickens have come home to roost' for us humans expecting (or should that be eggspeckting!) to sit down to a traditional festive feast of poultry and game. It's a case of 'fowl play' and it's 'no yolk' folks!

Enough corny jokes there to fill many a Christmas cracker, but the more serious message is that bird flu has struck yet again, this time starting in September which is much earlier than previous winters with widespread death amongst sea birds on Scilly. However as the virulent disease spreads inland in both wild birds and then into domesticated poultry flocks, current updated figures show that over 100 confirmed cases have been identified in UK flocks since October 1st. More alarmingly several outbreaks have been in some of the most regulated, bio-secure health and welfare poultry units.

APHA (Animal & Plant Health Agency) who oversee all veterinary operations and implement any full flock cull, highlight how a simple wild bird infected dropping which may contain a thousand doses, in turn could wipe out an entire colony of poultry - so every form of biosecurity protection is being implemented. This in turn has resulted much as last winter in the compulsory housing of all poultry from 7th November, however small the flock numbers. Consumers face the real threat of a shortage of eggs from laying hens, no longer free range status even if in welfare controlled barn situations.

There will be an even bigger challenge to source a fresh turkey for Christmas as many are traditionally outdoor reared and even the larger scale units struggle to fatten for the frozen market. However, the longer term future of many forms of poultry production from egg laying units through to broiler houses for meat, is the question as to how we as a country can keep bird flu under control when by our very geographic position we act as a stop off point for migratory wildfowl.

Further compounded by the economic pressures of any production system dependant upon grain diets and their doubling in price since the Ukrainian conflict, we are already seeing a mass exodus from both our pig and poultry sectors, with yet more to quit in 2023. So may we wish this Christmas that our taken for granted food and drink laden tables, all so carefully produced by generations of farmers and growers worldwide - who this past 12 months have faced many challenges and pressure from weather extremes, economic instability, international conflict, world market supply and now fresh disease threats - that we can all hope for better times to come for 'one and all'. Merry Christmas from everyone 'Down on the Farm'!

### Stoke Climsland Gardening Club

The November meeting of the Club was a talk by Trevor Wiltshire of Wadebridge, who spoke on "Cyclamen Society field trips". Trevor retired from RHS Wisley and is the international registrar for the Cyclamen species and a life member of the Cyclamen Society. He has been on several field trips, notably to Turkey. There are over 20 species of Cyclamen originating from around the Mediterranean: from Morocco in the west to Syria and Iran in the east, from north Africa to the Alps.

Cyclamen are ancient plants, going back 60M years. They have a tuber, an underground stem swelling that gets bigger every year - and once established, they can live 20-100 years. They like loamy well-drained soil. Take a handful of soil and press it together; if it stays as a ball it probably needs more grit.


He showed pictures of the different varieties and the sort



of terrain in which they are found. Some species only occur wild in specific locations; for example, C confusum from NW Crete, C elegans from N Iran, C libanoticum only from a single mountain in Lebanon.

What a year for tree fruits! First cherries, then pears and now there are still tons of apples on the trees! If you're wondering how to use your fruit and you've missed the apple juicing time, we have some good recipe books for sale at the Old School.

#### Mark 4:35-41

In our lives we all go through our own personal storms; it's how we deal with it when we are in them. Do we turn to Jesus or try to deal with it ourselves?

I recently heard of a lady who had cancer, when asked if she had a faith, she said "I did have but now I don't". She lost her faith during her battle with cancer. None of us know how we would manage in the same circumstance. When we go through these storms, life can be very disorientating and irrational, we have choices to make! God will answer our prayers, not always in the way we want but, on this occasion, it was perfect timing. When going through storms in our lives it is a time to cry out to Jesus, he will answer you. David in the Psalms said "I know the Lord is with me always. I will not be shaken, for He is right beside me." We must not forget that David was a man of flesh and blood just like any of us, so let us turn our eyes upon Jesus and look to his wonderful face.

We continue to house the Cornwall Council library, and the Parish Archive. New ideas include - Food for Thought, Repair Shop, Food Group, Family History Group, provision of a "warm space" and we are looking at the possibility of sharing events with The Parish Hall. We would also like to get drama and special music events up and running again and would welcome new ideas.

#### The buildings

We have not had any major building costs to meet in the last 12 months but there continues to be a need to service our 160-year-old building. The current energy cost crisis has highlighted the need for costly improvements to the insulation and heating of the building.

The improvements to the stage and to the audio-visual systems, made some time ago, continue to serve us well. We have been able to improve our free WiFi access and reduce the cost of the contract.

Improvements to the old toilets in the car park were supported by the Parish Council. The recycling facility continues to complement the kerbside collection whilst raising charitable funds. Catering



#### Mature Movers Dance Class

We kick a leg, swing an arm, curve the back and twirl. Everyone is enjoying the thrill of moving to music and the chance to bring their own expression to the movement. This is a Contemporary Dance class for mature movers (50+ age group). It challenges the stereotype of "movement to music" for that age group that typically consists of robotic, impassionate and repetitive movement. This dance class is so much more; expressive, engaging and somewhere to immerse mind, body and soul.

We use a variety of images and different "flavours" of music to inspire our dance sequences: opera, jazz, classical, world music, popular music and more. The movement is free-flowing with an interesting dynamic range. Simple sequences are taught which allow plenty of room for self-expression.

Did you know, that when you dance, your body releases endorphins (feel good hormones)? It therefore lifts your mood and increases your self-esteem, as well as increasing muscle strength, flexibility, circulation and aerobic fitness. Numerous scientific studies, such as (2003) research done at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine, prove that dance improves all round health, and particularly for the mature mover, Keeps the brain "young", as cognitive function, memory and neural connections are stimulated.

After class, everyone walks out with a smile on their face, not even realising what a total body and brain work-out, they have just had!







#### Hello, my name is Martine Cox




