


A VILLAGE INSTITUTION CONTINUES....

UPDATE:

Hello everyone. Well, our summer bookings remain good, and we opened the hall for the Coronation and will be doing the same for the Village Show as the community welcomes the use of our toilet facilities and enclosed space. We have our AGM on Monday 24th July at 7.30pm in the Parish Hall and all are welcome to hear about our progress so far.

We have the METS performing for us on 15th July at 7.30pm again in the Parish Hall, with refreshments and a bite to eat. Please get your tickets at the Post Office and watch for further adverts.

We continue to work with our Friends of Stoke Climsland Parish Hall and the Social Club to put on additional events.

Our quest for appropriate grants continues in an extremely competitive market. Some of you will have seen that Truro Cathedral was successful and Newquay was successful to develop an 'all year round' tourist attraction. We are up against the big boys for limited funds, but we will continue as best as we can.

We were very sad to hear about the passing of Mark Duddridge. Mark was one of our special guests at our February 2023 workshop to review our progress. He had become a very good ambassador for our cause and was working with our fund-raising lead, Geoff Giles, to target specific trusts and foundations. In fact, he was a trustee at one of them, at the time of writing this we are awaiting their response to our funding application.

Following on from that very workshop we have been assessing the feedback and working, particularly, with the Duchy (our Landlord) as well as The Prince's Foundation to see how we can maximise that feedback from our hall users and the greater community. The (high??) costs of the planned refurbishment was one issue. Since then, we have sought further cost estimates and taken advice from local builders and feel we have made good strides to bring the overall costs down. As a result, we are planning that work will start on the hall roof by this autumn. The roof is our starting point to make the building weatherproof and we can then move into later phases.

We remain very keen to seek community support, whether as a Trustee, or a Friend. We are a small team and work on this as volunteers. We all have other family or business 'commitments' and the more we can share the workload the more our community can continue to enjoy our facilities. This need for volunteers is not unique to the Parish Hall: we see a new editor is required for the OSN, we see that the OS is seeking new Trustees, we see our Parish Church is seeking volunteers to help paint etc the Church to keep costs down. We are all in the same predicament. We all need community support for community facilities.

'Farmers deliver thrice daily!'

We, in farming, continue to receive mixed messages to accompany the hot air coming from both Government and Supermarkets alike, as promises last as long as an ice cream at the seaside in this glorious summer sun.

Fresh from the inaugural No 10 'Farm to Fork' Summit which promised to address the dual issues of the imbalance in the food production chain by means of strengthening the powers of the Grocery Code Adjudicator/Ombudsman as well as to produce an annual UK Food Security Report to meet a minimum 60% self-sufficiency target. The spectacle and importance of all key players coming together with the Prime Minister was ironically further highlighted by TV Celebrity Farmworker, Kaleb Cooper of 'Clarkson's Farm' fame. His most timely reminder was that you may only need a Solicitor once in your lifetime, see a doctor once a year, but everyone depends upon a farmer three times a day for food. This clearly hit the nail on the head.

So, it seems somewhat bizarre that, just a few weeks later, plans emerged of a price fixing cap on essential foods. This was met with industry wide condemnation and outright rejection from the major supermarket retailers, despite food inflation topping 20%. Such intervention in the market has not been implemented since the early 1970's Economic Crisis, before our entry into the then Common Market. Today UK farm businesses, now post-Brexit, are in a far

different situation. They are increasingly at the mercy of a global free market as well as partway through the transition from the Basic Payment Funded Farm Support. They should be encouraged to restructure and improve productivity, not be price capped by intervention control measures.

However, welcome news for our local hard-working family farms comes from the full support of our own Cornwall Council. They have endorsed Cornish Agriculture by rejecting calls for an antimeat/plant-based policy as has been adopted by several up-country local authorities. A motion to promote seasonal and local produce, explicitly including meat and dairy products at council events, was passed with full support. They are also urging local residents to shop locally and take advantage of home-grown, affordable, nutritious food, irrespective of dietary preference. A most welcome dose of local common sense despite the seasonal heat and hot air from some in authority. A clear message to enjoy the 'Best of British' this summertime and a timely intervention to back young Caleb in his reminder that all farmers continue to deliver thrice daily 'Down on the Farm.'

It was resumed after the war in August 1919 and successfully ran every year until recent unprecedented (how often we heard that word!) events which pushed us to hold our first virtual show on Facebook. This proved to be a tremendous success and enabled us to produce a calendar featuring many of the wonderful entries which raised some much-needed funds. The show has grown in recent years and now along with exhibits in the marquee, offers music from Callington Town Band, a variety of stalls, children's entertainment, a bouncy castle with slide and a bar on the village green along with cream teas in the Old School. We have disabled parking on the village green and lots closer by. Watch out for details on the evening event this year being organised by Stoke Climsland Sports and Social Club.

We are lucky to have a thriving community of gardeners, bakers, artists, growers, crafters, photographers, and writers which usually result in almost 1500 entries. RIDING FOR THE DISABLED AT DUCHY COLLEGE

My name is Sarah Thomas and for many years I have belonged to the Duchy College group of Riding for the Disabled. Pre-pandemic I wrote a regular column about our activities and am now resuming the task, so here goes! Very sadly, our lovely group secretary, Dea Price, died just before Easter. She had been a member of the Duchy College group for many years, and we all miss her badly.



Following the worst of Covid 19, we started up again but unfortunately with fewer helpers, we had to reduce the number of riders per ride from six to three. It is great to be back but sad that we cannot help as many people. And this is where you come in. Duchy College RDA needs you!

We are all volunteers in the group. The various roles include leading horses, walking beside the rider to help them and keep them safe, watching the ride from the side-lines to check for any problems, and an instructor for each ride. Someone also takes note of who rides, leads and side-walks which horse and records the report from the side-walker on the rider's progress. Other tasks include setting out the indoor school and clearing up at the end, very importantly making the tea and coffee and even more importantly, picking up the poo - a task we all share! Interestingly, volunteering with us has benefits for the volunteer as well as the riders. 

The current line-up is Graham Trevarton (trumpet), Dave Vaughan (clarinet, tenor sax), Ron Milford (trombone), John Baker (banjo), Jeff Burton (tuba), Tony Quinn (percussion, washboard, guitar). The band plays a variety of Trad and New Orleans jazz tunes with a hint of '50s skiffle. Their main aim is to entertain the audience.

A STORY OF A STAINED GLASS WINDOW, HITLER, GUY BURGESS, COLDITZ AND AUDREY HEPBURN

Whilst in the church recently, I came across a family party looking for the stained glass window dedicated to their relative, Sir Clive Burn. They had only become aware of it recently and had traveled quite a long way to see it. They told me a little of Sir Clive but, more intriguingly, about his son, Michael. After a little research, I thought OSN readers might be interested in some details of the life of someone who had connections with Stoke Climsland.

Sir Clive was a very establishment figure and was Secretary of the Duchy of Cornwall for many years. His son, Michael, born in 1912, was determined to ignore the carefully signposted pathways of his heritage. He horrified his father by turning down MCC membership and, when he confided to his father that he might be homosexual, was sent to see George V's doctor at the Palace, who gave him benzedrine injections which made him hyperactive. Burn was then referred to a Harley Street specialist and, after a cursory physical examination, the young



Michael's social connections, as well as his writing abilities, secured him a job on The Times' foreign news desk. From there he witnessed at close quarters the intricacies of both the Munich crisis and the Abdication. He said his father had groaned as the king made his abdication broadcast. When Michael asked him why, he replied: "My dear boy, in 1914 thousands of men had to give up the support of the women they loved".

In the war, Michael was in the Commandos and, as a captain, he took part in the famous St Nazaire raid. He was captured during this and spent the rest of the war in Colditz. For his bravery during the action, he was awarded an MC. After liberation by the Americans, he sent shipments of cigarettes to an old Dutch friend for her to barter for penicillin for her gravely ill daughter; the daughter recovered and went on to become famous as Audrey Hepburn. Burn became a novelist, poet and playwright, as well as serving for many years as a superb foreign correspondent for The Times, covering some of the high spots of Eastern European history, including the trials of Mihailovich and Cardinal Mindszenty. In the 1960s he ran on communist principles a mussel-farming co-operative in North Wales, a venture that proved financially disastrous as he insisted on turning all the profits over to his workers.

His life has been described as 'eccentric, exciting and enviable' and his autobiography Turned Towards the Sun is well worth hunting out and reading. He died at 97 years in 2010. **Deri Parsons**

DON'T BIN IT - FIX IT! AT THE STOKE CLIMSLAND REPAIR CAFÉ

When you read this, the fourth Repair Café will have happened (17th June), the July date will be being advertised (15th), and do not forget 19th August, we will be open then too, so put these dates in your diary! Before then, there is a Catch-Up on Saturday morning, 8th July at 9.30am, for all those who expressed

an interest at the Start-Up Meeting back in January - as well as anyone who may have become interested in being a Repairer, or a Café Helper, since! In the meantime, we thought we would give a little resumé of how this new facility for the Parish (and beyond) has gone so far.

Our first 'Open to the Public' event in March was a great success, and it was encouraging to everyone involved in the organisation to see it up and running! Out of the fifteen items brought in for repair or advice that month, an impressive seven items were repaired on site, parts of two items were taken away to be repaired for return in April, one owner went away to acquire a part for fitting and repair in April, and four items were assessed, and advice given where repair wasn't possible 'in-house'. Only one item, an inaccessible

Vacuum Cleaner, left as it arrived! Since then, we have had two more Repair Café events and it is going from strength to strength! April saw an incredible twenty-six items brought in for repair with a success rate in house of 62%, and

further items being returned in May with parts for fitting! The glorious weather in May meant the Café was quieter, with a total of five out of fifteen items successfully repaired in-house, and three items returning in June. One thing I learnt in May was that if you have smelt burning from the item you have brought in, the chances are that it will be unrepairable, as was the case with four burnt out motors this month!


The range of items brought in for repair up to now is impressive and has included a clock, a lamp, a sewing machine, a VHS Recorder, jewellery, a torch, a floor washer, an upright vacuum cleaner, a wooden box, a mobile phone, a car battery charger, a toaster, a soup maker, a mini TV, a kitchen mixer, a baby bouncer, a sander, a laminator, a door bell, a canvas chair, a drill, headphones, and a mini fan! Special mention goes to a robot vacuum

cleaner, which did a good job of sweeping the Old School floor - entertaining the room - until it stopped after just two minutes every time! Arriving a little late for complete assessment, it is returning in June for another go! Then there

was the sock which needed darning, the owner of which went away educated in the darning of the other sock! The Onesie which needed a zip repair after being chewed by a rabbit, the Teddy Bear that needed re-stitching after an unfortunate encounter with the dog, and the delightful Mr Percy Porker Grunter Pig, a homemade stuffed piggie who needs some new clothes after a very long and much-loved life - so far! LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

The International Energy Agency (IEA) expects economic headwinds to reduce oil growth to 860,000 bpd next year

Some good news. Peak in global oil demand 'in sight before end of decade'. The IEA's executive director, Fatih Birol, said: "The shift to a clean energy economy is picking up pace, with a peak in global oil demand in sight before the end of this decade as electric vehicles, energy efficiency and other technologies advance." However, the Paris-based agency expects economic headwinds to reduce growth to 860,000 barrels per day (bpd) next year, and increasing use of electric vehicles to help to reduce that to 400,000 bpd in 2028 for overall demand of 105.7m. The agency said Russia's invasion of Ukraine, and the volatility the war injected into commodity markets, had encouraged greater investment in clean energy. Joe Biden's \$369bn Inflation Reduction Act package of climate subsidies has also enticed investor capital into low-carbon projects in the US, and put pressure on the UK and elsewhere in Europe to respond with greater support for green energy on this side of the Atlantic.


