FROM FEAST TO FAMINE

We only had to go out blackberrying to notice that along even one stretch of lane, the blackberries on one clump were fully ripe while on another they were still only red or even still green. This natural variability ensures that the crop lasts over a much longer season and whatever the vagaries of the weather, one lot will be palatable even if others are spoilt by rain. In the case of the Blackberry there is not just one species but in fact many 'micro species', hence the variability of the ripening time, flavour, 'pippiness', leaf size, white or pink flowers, and other features.



This year there is a huge crop of Rowan berries but as this seems to be the case all over the country and on every tree, some other factor must to apply, because the conditions experienced by every tree in the land at pollination time, or berry-formation time, can't all have been the same everywhere.

And what determines the sporadic 'Mast years' when there is a huge crop of acorns on the nation's Oaks, and nuts or mast on the Beeches? This year, acorns seem to be very scarce.

Closer to home is the apple crop; beside the habit of some varieties to crop every other year, we may experience years of glut and years with a generally poor harvest. This probably reflects the unsuitable weather either the previous year when the future flower buds should have been forming, or the current spring when pollination and fruit-set were poor because of wet or cold conditions at flowering time.

Every gardener is painfully aware that crop yields vary from year to year. So many factors may be involved and there are many imponderables. What have I done differently to get super beetroot this year, but the Purple-sprouting Broccoli cropped on wispy plants which soon died this June instead of making robust plants with plenty of sproutings next January?

Only time will tell us about the future of the Ash and the now widespread evidence of 'Dieback'. Going along any road where roadside Ashes grow, at present it's noticeable that one tree may be in full health while the next is dead and another obviously ailing. Is this because we haven't yet seen the full effects of this devastating disease, or is there hope that some trees are more resistant and will survive and pass on their immunity?

Down on the Farm - 'The circle of life'

Welcome back to 'Down on the Farm' - Not that we ever went away in the first place!

As was most evident farming & food production continued apace throughout the Pandemic, even being classified as 'key workers' by some whilst maybe taken for granted by others. Ironically it is now for a variety of reasons that we face emptying shelves in the supermarkets more so than at the beginning of Covid-19!

However, one positive trend to arise from this most bizarre period in recent history, has been the increased interest in all matters farming and a renewed appreciation for the countryside all around us.

So appropriately the autumn season coincides with the start of the farming year. The harvest now finally completed, crops in the barn, pits full of forage and livestock soon ready for winter housing as any remaining grazing becomes less nutritious, we start the new 'circle of life' once again.



Autumn sown 'Winter Cereals' - of Wheat, Barley & Oats, along with the earlier planted Oil Seed Rape and Grass Ley reseeds, now all need to be drilled, tilled or planted ahead of any heavy rain and deteriorating soil conditions to allow good germination rates and seedling establishment in readiness for any harsh winter weather.

Ever more 'cultivation & planting' methods are being developed under the banner of 'regenerative farming', as we all adapt to climate change and move even closer toward carbon neutrality - net zero targets set by both National Government & Local Authority including our own Parish & Cornwall Council's. As an industry we too remain up for the challenge incorporating it into the 'circle of life' production - Down on the Farm.



Reflections on the Environment

As I write the COP 26 conference in Glasgow is approaching fast and barely a day goes by without the environmental crisis being in the news. We are repeatedly reminded of the problem, its causes and what needs to be done about it. There is, however, a nagging uncertainty about whether the global co-operation necessary to slow and then reverse the global crisis will be possible; and even if it is, whether action will follow quickly enough.

It is becoming increasingly clear that we cannot go on living as we have been; we either change or face disaster. Many of the certainties and securities we have become accustomed to are being swept away. This has led many to re-evaluate what is really important. Others are anticipating an unknown and potentially bleak future with anxiety, even fear.

So what has this to do with the church and Christianity? Well, Jesus' disciples were also concerned about what the future held and asked him about it. The answer involved bad news and good. The bad news being that in the future things would get really tough, so bad that without an intervention, no one would survive! Sound familiar? The good news was that there would be an intervention and the impending disaster would be averted. Many Christians understand this intervention to be the second coming of Jesus to establish a reign of peace and justice. Anyone who is willing to accept his authority will have a part to play in that reign. The message is good news indeed to anyone who fears for the future of the planet and the life it supports. The heart of the Christian gospel is that the self-destructive tendencies of the human race will not prevail. There is hope, and this hope can inspire us to work towards a better future in the here and now.

The current crisis and uncertainty may also prompt some to ask the age old question - Is there a purpose to life or is it just a random phenomenon that came into being by chance? The eminent scientist Dr. Francis Collins said: *'I cannot see how nature could have created itself. Only a supernatural force that is outside of space and time could have done that.'*

If the current environmental crisis has raised questions and the recent lockdowns given time to reflect on the meaning of life, there will be the opportunity to explore these further by joining an Alpha Group. The Guardian described Alpha as: *'What Alpha offers, and what is attracting thousands of people, is permission, rare in secular culture, to discuss the big questions of life and death and their meaning.'*

THE STOKE CLIMSLAND GARDENING CLUB OCTOBER MEETING

Dr Hannah Fox gave a fascinating talk on "Growing a Gardener", a tribute to her mother Lynn who was our Secretary and who sadly died this summer. Hannah's childhood was spent on her parents pig farm near Dobwalls where began her love for gardens and farming. She is a plant biologist, has worked as an agriculture lecturer at Reading University and the Duchy College and is now based near Falmouth, working with local farms on carbon sequestration with Farm Carbon Toolkit. She showed us a 'carbon audit' she did on her own house, trying to balance income (carbon sequestration in the garden and allotment) against expenditure (electricity, heating, travel etc.).

Much of the talk was on soil, its structure and microbial content - and began with having a good sniff of a soil sample. (Something Lynn would always do!). Sometimes plants cannot access all the nutrients within the soil and that is where microbes come in. Herbal leys in grasslands are a mix of grasses and legumes which root at different depths and so access more nutrients. Soil shouldn't be too impacted in order to allow drainage and air penetration; roots need to breathe as well as leaves. She puts compost and seaweed on her garden without digging it in -let the worms do the digging. She sows mixtures of vegetables together to reduce disease propagation. When cleared, she sows a cover crop of mustard or buckwheat which is eventually chopped up to break down on the soil

surface. Useful organic advice for improving the soil.

Our Club meetings are held on the first Monday of the month, 7:00 pm in the Parish Hall. Visitors are welcome. The next is on the 1st November when Martin Pope will ask "Am I a Plantaholic?" *Mike Casebow*

SOUTH HILL BAT PROJECT - News update

St Sampson's Church, South Hill where the project is situated, has recently received it's bat mitigation licence and the urgent roof works have now begun, being sensitive to the resident bats who have finished breeding for this year. Some bat boxes have been sited to house any bats found in the roof, whilst works are being done, with an ecologist to oversee their safety.

STOKE CLIMSLAND CLIMATE CHANGE ACTION GROUP (SCCCAG)

SCCCAG set up a flood resilience workshop at Stoke Climsland Hall following a number of local homes suffering from flooding over the years and after seeing a webinar from the Cornwall Community Flood Forum (CCFF) including demonstrations of various pieces of Property Flood Risk (PFR) equipment.

On 9th October, Laurence Couldrick, CEO of the Westcountry Rivers Trust gave an opening talk, as both he and their offices are based in Stoke Climsland he has close knowledge of the landscape and flood risk issues. His maps of flood risk areas were met with real interest by those attending.

Also contributing were Gitty Ankers, MBE, Chair of the Cornwall Community Flood Forum "We aim to support communities, homes and businesses to become more resilient to the impacts of flooding, and Louisa Inch, MD of Premier Water Solutions showcased devices ranging from flood barriers, valves for all sizes of air brick covers as well as pumps of different sizes and many more items

The attendees found all this of great interest and hope to form their own common interest group to follow up some site visits with Louisa to assess their needs and offer advice on suitable pieces of equipment.

'Our proposal has been carefully considered and the best continuing action that we recommend for Rowden Field is to observe it repeatedly during the next year, documenting the emergence of different flora and fauna as they seasonally appear. This would entail regular visits for which there will be documentation of the specimens that make up this rich area.

Therefore, it is SCEN's proposal that for the foreseeable future nothing but the essential attention to bracken should be done. When at least one year's surveys are collected and compiled and the splendid value of this ecological environment is revealed, a further programme will be established.'
