

NEWS FROM THE PARISH HALL AND AN INVITE TO THE AGM

At the recent Jubilee event, the current plans for the refurbishment of the Parish Hall were on display. Quite a few people came to see them but, just in case you couldn't, they have been posted on local Facebook pages and you can get copies from Martin Howlett (07855 079460; martin@deerparkfarmcottages. co.uk) or Geoff Giles (07740 165730; geoff_a_giles@hotmail.com). Briefly, the main structural changes will be the refurbishment of

the roof, opening up the inner vaulted ceiling, improving the toilets and providing access to a public toilet facility, even when the main hall is closed. The main hall floor will be replaced, the kitchen will be renewed, and a new gas boiler installed. Additionally, the windows will be refurbished in accordance with the Grade II listing requirements and the electrics and plumbing will be brought up to a standard that will 'future proof' our hall.

rubbish lurking in the undergrowth, but we are pleased to report that it amounted to just half a sack.





Our very own Luckett Volunteer Band (we have one!) opened proceedings as we stood and sang the National Anthem and, led by Richard Long (lead guitar), played an excellent series of songs and other 'numbers', both together and individually throughout the afternoon. Meanwhile, Lucy and Graham Penney won the monetary prize for the best scarecrow amidst fierce competition from throughout the village.

The 2 celebration cakes were sufficient for everyone present to have a proper sized piece, with enough left for those who couldn't make the bash to have one taken to their doors. Fortunately, the cake organiser had asked the event organiser the week before if numbers attending were still the 25 on the party website only to be told that the figure of 70 had been murmured; actually just under 90 attended the party.



As a tea party free tea, coffee, milk and sugar were provided and properly ignored in favour of brown ale and Melchisedechs of tastier drinks emerging for private consumption from bags and boxes along with caviar etc in the communal meals.

Luckett is a very special place with a profound community cohesion and spirit which showed again on 'Jubilee Day' - that's why we live here. And when's the next village special occasion? Well, it's been some days since the Tea Party so it may be Lucketteers will feel compelled to have a gathering tonight.







'Stepping up to the plate'

Platinum Jubilee Celebrations over, the Royal Cornwall Show made a welcome return with Royal Guests of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall, plus a surprise appearance of PM Boris and now hopefully some return to normality of summer events post the Pandemic of 2020/21.

However, it was to be a quick return of the Prime Minister to the West Cornwall to then officially launch the long awaited Government Food Strategy, along with a £270 million fund to invest in new technologies, tackle farm labour shortages, reduce methane emissions and food waste, all designed to back the farming industry, boost Britain and help protect consumers against future economic shocks by safeguarding food security.

A most welcome announcement at a time of global turmoil in commodity market, with unsustainable fuel price hikes, a continuing war in Ukraine with Russia now playing the 3rd World food supply disruption card and the ever growing threat of the climate emergency. The report however did not on this occasion include detail of the original intentions of author Henry Dimbleby, Leon food restaurant founder, which was a review to address the lifestyles of an increasing number of our population obesity cases through a sugar and salt tax on unhealthy food, plus the acknowledgement of our unacceptable food waste in a throwaway society.

The strategy was launched at one of the biggest field vegetable growers in the country - Southern England Farms, near Hayle, the emphasis on the undersupplied markets of British Fruit & Vegetables both contrasted the advancing technology in field scale production whilst noting the real shortage in labour for harvest pickers.

Thus government policy now seems torn between rising farm gate prices to counter the raging 'agflation' now over 30%, which in turn pushes up general food inflation, and the drive towards greater self - sufficiency and national food security at a time of global imbalance, plus a commitment to supporting nature and habitats through its biodiversity policies within the Environment Land Management Strategy (ELM's) post the Brexit Transition.

In summary, whilst many commentators understandably now bluntly state it is 'food versus views' finding a middle ground solution where both can deliver for mankind and the environment at a much more affordable cost to society remains the challenge. Given the many ideas brought together in this new food strategy not withstanding its obvious health related omissions - we as farmers stand ready to step up to the plate - real food for thought as we once again approach harvest time Down on the Farm.

A final reminder to share your views on food, farming, biodiversity goals & net zero targets, along with many other aspects of the climate emergency at the inaugural Community Climate Fair on Saturday 16th July across the venues of Stoke Climsland Parish Hall, The

Old School, Primary School and The Green -10am until 4pm. We welcome all your support. Martin Howlett






